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Physical education teachers earn about the same salary as any other teacher in the public school system. The average salary depends on where you work and primary or secondary education. Physical education teachers could also earn extra money as coaches of sports teams, especially at the high school level. The average salary for high school teachers in the United States was \$53,230 in May 2010, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Elementary school teachers in Ile-du-Ile made an average salary of \$51,380 per year, the BLS reported. Wages vary widely in different parts of the country. The salaries of high school teachers range from less than \$35,020 for the lowest paid 10 per cent to more than \$83,230 for the top 10 per cent. Many physical education teachers supplement their salaries with money from the training school or local teams. Teachers, whether in primary or secondary schools, all have a minimum bachelor's degree. Physical education teachers generally have a strong command of physical education, taking subjects such as kinesiology, exercise physiology and the administration of physical education. Public school teachers are generally certified by their state; teachers in private schools may not be required to obtain a teaching certification. Primary teacher employment increased by about 17 per cent over the same period, which is around the average. A master's degree will answer in some cases, will exceed the requirements to teach in a public high school, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The minimum education requirement for high school teachers is usually a bachelor's degree, and you must master in the subject you will be teaching. In addition to a degree in the subject you teach, high school teachers must complete an internship or residency to acquire practical skills. The regulations for private schools are not the same as those of public schools, but many public schools have the same for their ability. Regulations and terminology vary from state to state. In some states, a teacher with a bachelor's degree may become certified and begin her teaching career, but must then complete a master's degree. In Alaska, a master's degree is required for high school teachers, although a bachelor's degree in physical education and a master's degree in teaching meet the requirements, according to the AUA Community and Technical College. The BLS notes that you may need to take specific education courses to meet your state's requirements.
